A Few Words with member Lowell Schultz . . .



Q: Where did you grow up and where do you live now?

A: I grew up in western Wisconsin near Arcadia. My father was a farmer. I now live in Maple Glen, PA, near Ambler with my wife.

Q: Do you have a background in electronics/radio/TV, etc?

A: Yes, when I was in the service I trained as a radio repairman with the Army Security, which was part of the Signal Corps. I then worked for 28 years with Honeywell doing low level design and then software development for system testing.

Q: What got you interested in old radios?

A: In the early 1970s there was an old woman in our church, and the pastor and I helped fix things for her. When she died, one of her possessions was sold — a Philco 87 radio, and I bought it. It sat around for quite awhile, but after I retired, I opened it up and fixed it.

Q: How long have you been collecting?

A: Since about 1988 after retirement from Honeywell.

Q: What are your radio interests (battery sets, consoles, etc.)?

A: I have mostly table radios and some AK consoles.

Q: How many radios do you have?

A: About 50.

Q: Where do you get your radios?

A: Mostly auctions, yard sales and Kutztown.

Q: Do you do your own restoration/repairs?

A: Yes, full cabinet restore and repairs.

Q: What's your favorite part of the hobby?

A: Cabinet restoration is rewarding, especially a set that is special to someone.

Q: What is your least favorite part?

A: Trying to find intermittent problems and open coils.

Q: What is your most prized radio?

A: An Atwater Kent 60C table with radio bought at Kutztown. I had my mobile home there and it was quite an effort to fit the large radio through the small door of the mobile home. But I got it in.

Q: How long have you been a member of DVHRC? **A:** About 5 years

Thanks to Don Rector who spotted this article in the North Penn Reporter:

"During World War II, many industries advertised jobs for women to help in the war effort. In the era before transistors and digital devices as we know it today, the vacuum tube was a key device used in household radios

and military equipment.

"National Union was one of dozens of manufacturers in the receiving and CRT-picture tube industry. There were many manufacturers making and supplying parts to support the industry.

"The National Union factory in Lansdale later became Lansdale Tube Co., a division of Philco Corp. Ford Motor Co. purchased Philco as a subsidiary.

"The original Philco factories eventually went out of business. The Lansdale location on Church Road, after all the buildings were demolished, became the Station Square development."
